
F. Stakeholder Analysis (Stakeholder Matrix)



Box A

These are stakeholders who seem to have a high degree of influence on the Community Forest, who are also of high importance for its success. It will be necessary to create good working relationships with these stakeholders, to ensure an effective coalition of support for the functioning of the CF; e.g. senior County officials, FDA and political Representatives.

Box B

These are stakeholders of high importance to the success of the Community Forest, but with low influence. This means that they will require special initiatives if their interests are to be protected. These may include traditionally marginalized groups, e.g. non-literate community people, youth, seniors and women. They may traditionally own the forest but have little 'voice' in its management.

Box C

These are stakeholders with high influence. They can affect the project outcomes, but their interests are not necessarily in line with the overall goals for which the community intends to manage the forest. They might be County Officials or economic group, who can exercise considerable discretion over general land resource uses, including forests. This could mean that these stakeholders may be a source of significant risk, and they will need careful monitoring and management.

Box D

The stakeholders in this box have low influence on the community forest management. They are of low importance to the community forest objectives. Therefore, they may require limited monitoring or evaluation, since they are of low priority.
